which is a projection of embodied perception. Indirect and direct mappings were explained with examples. It is claimed that not all negative expressions involve mapping mediated through positive conceptual schemas and it is possible to have mappings of the negative expressions with corresponding negative schema without invoking the schema of the positive state of affairs.

Sourabh Srivastava's paper titled Semantic Analysis of the Discourse Markers 'although' and 'though' has explained the functions of discourse markers as sentence conjuncture, focus marker and turn-taking marker in a discourse. They are the expressions that operate as indicators at the level of discourse and have component of meaning which resists truth-conditional statement. This paper attempts to provide rule-based account of the different translation equivalents of although and though in Hindi and has explained the problems of translation of these words from English to Hindi.

Bidisha Bhattacharjee in 'na' as an Evaluative Marker in Bangla tries to explore a novel set of data where na appears without any negative interpretation at logical form. This paper discusses the specific expletive occurrence of na in the propositional complement of emotive predicates. Considering the clausal distribution of expletive na in Bangla and expletive negation in other languages which show a similar pattern of behaviour across languages, it is proposed that although there are similarities in distribution of expletive negation, it shows some functional differences based on context.

Session I-B started at 3.20 p.m. and Dr. Anil Thakur chaired the session. Six papers were presented in this session.

Dr. Sanjukta Ghosh presented Generative Lexicon Analysis of Banglainflected Compound Words. This paper has discussed different types of Bangla compounds which are marked with genitive. Bangla is a genitive dominant language and many karaka functions are morphologically expressed by the genitive marker -r/-er. The peculiarity of Bangla compounds lies in the fact that irrespective of the relations among the words of the compound, the first word of the compound may be marked with genitive. Different types of genitive inflected compounds are taken and analyzed in generative lexicon framework.

Sreedevi Polpakkara in her paper Structure of Motion Event Predicates in Malayalam remarked that there seems to be a general consensus that Malayalam and other Dravidian languages are verbframed. The hallmark of verb-framed languages seems to be that the core event, path and telicity is coded in the verb while the core event or the manner, rate of motion or intensity of the motion is coded in an adverbial or adjunct-like element. However, Dravidian languages including Malayalam are different from other proto-typical verbframed languages because vector path and telicity are not coded in one place.

Soumyadeep Mukherjee's paper titled Comparative Reduplication: A Cognitive-Descriptive Approach proposed a new type of reduplicated structure labelled 'comparative reduplication' which focused mainly on the form of comparative reduplication found in Bangla and examples are also

drawn from Hindi and English. This paper also makes a distinction between the types of constructions and the differences in structural, semantic, tonal and usage patterns.

Bishaka Sharma in Verb BE, Verbs of Existence and Possession in the Five Languages of Tirap (Arunachal Pradesh) attempted to probe into the verbs used in existential and possessive constructions of the languages spoken at Upper Wancho, Lower Wancho, Nocte and sub-tribes Otto, Khappa and Tutsa. These languages show mutual intelligibility in their cognate lexemes. Nocte is a dominant group in the district HQ Khonsa. People of other linguistic communities show some amount of intelligibility with Nocte. Thev communicate with other linguistic groups in Assamese or Hindi.

Pitambar Behra's paper Measuring Similarities between Lexical resourced Indo-Aryan Languages: A Computational Perspective explained the lexical similarity as a criteria for bringing out distinctions between language and dialect and other parameters such as mutual intelligibility, domain usage and dialect continuum. He has adopted SVM-based POS taggers for measuring lexical similarity between Dogri-Hindi, Magadhi-Hindi, Bhojpuri-Hindi, Awadhi-Hindi. The objective of the paper is to show that one can take the assistance of the prominent parts of speech taggers of Hindi and Odiya to build automatic annotators for low-resourced languages.

TEACHING COURSE FOR BANGLA

A short-term language teaching course of Bengali for 15 days to the non-Bengali students and research scholars commenced on 7th



October in ISDL, Thiruvananthapuram. The inaugural session at 10 a.m. was presided over by Prof. Naduvattom Gopalakrishnan, Hon. Director of ISDL. In his presidential address, he emphasized the need for well-trained translators who can translate Malayalam books to Bengali language. He said that a good number of Bengali classical novels have been translated into Malayalam but not much books from Malayalam to Bengali. He promised to consider starting an advanced course in Bengali after evaluating the results of the present course. He also welcomed the guests and participants extending all sorts of help from the ISDL for the success of the course.

In his inaugural address, Prof. G.K. Panikkar, former Director of ISDL and founder-member of DLA & ISDL said that a basic knowledge of Bengali language has become inevitable for the people of Kerala because Bengali workers have established their presence in almost all walks of life, from constructions and supermarkets to agricultural farms spread over urban and rural areas of the state.

Prof. M. Rama in his felicitating speech reminded the four stages of learning a new language - learning, reading, speaking and writing. He said that acquiring language skills other than mother tongue is an advantage for the young people in the global job markets.

Sourav Chakraborty, the course director, introduced the contents of the course. The participants introduced themselves and it was found that most of them were research scholars from the University of Kerala and others included teachers and social workers.

EDWIN H. TUTTLE – A DRAVIDIAN SCHOLAR OF YESTERYEARS

Edwin Tuttle (1879-1939) was a distinguished American scholar who published a number of noteworthy articles on comparative Dravidian in 1920's and 30's. His articles have not come to the attention of Dravidian scholars of the modern period. Most of his studies appeared in the *Journal of American Philology* or *Journal of American Oriental Society*. His personal and academic life remains largely in the dark. The only information we have comes from the Obituary Record of Yale University, which was his *alma mater*. It gives the following information:

"Edwin Hotchkiss Tuttle was born in New Haven, Connecticut, on September 23, 1879 in New Haven, Conn. His father was Lucius Bement Tuttle, '63 L. and his mother, Emma Louise (Hotchkiss) Tuttle (Mount Holyoke ex-'77). Yale relatives include: Luzon B. Morris, '54 (uncle); Charles G. Morris '95, and Ray Morris, '01 (cousins).

He attended Hillhouse High School. He attended Yale College, graduating in 1901. While at Yale, he was First Berkeley Premium Freshman year; philosophical oration appointment Junior and Senior years and was a member of Phi Beta Kappa. Upon graduating, Tuttle continued his studies at the Yale Graduate School between 1901 and 1903, and for another year at the University of Paris. He was profoundly interested in language, and made it a lifelong goal to study all the known languages of the world. He taught language at the Mackenzie School in Dobbs Ferry, New York as well as at the Boys' Latin School in Baltimore, Maryland. On January 25, 1939, in Washington, D.C., Tuttle hanged himself.

He had been associated with the Languages Publishing Company, Washington, for about twenty years

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before his death; special editor connected with the publication of Webster's New International Dictionary; in recent years had resided in summer at Mount Carmel, Conn.; author: Dravidian Developments (1930) and numerous articles on philology and allied subjects published in American and European learned journals; member Association Phonétique Internationale and Center Church (Congregational), New Haven.

Unmarried.

Died January 25, 1939, in Washington, D.C. Took his own life. Buried in Edgewood Cemetery, Wolcott, Conn. Survived by two brothers, Lucius Tuttle, '01, and Charles P. Tuttle, '06.

Mr. Tuttle bequeathed his books, magazines, and pamphlets to the University."

From his articles, we can understand that he had a deep interest in Dravidian languages and that he closely followed the books and articles in this area. He was familiar with the works of Caldwell, Kittel, L.V. Ramaswami Iyer and also Suniti Kumar Chatterji. His publications include the following:

The inaugural session of the seminar started at 10.30 a.m. in the seminar hall of Rabindra Bhavan. Prof. Naduvattom Gopalakrishnan, Hon. Director, ISDL welcomed the gathering. Prof. G.K. Panikkar, former Hon. Director, ISDL chaired the session. In his presidential address, he has explained the objectives of the seminar and the necessity and responsibility of linguists to take initiative in developing various branches of Applied Linguistics. Prof. H.M. Maheshwaraiah, Vice Chancellor, Central University of Karnataka, Kalaburagi inaugurated the seminar. In his inaugural address, he has explained the current trends in applied linguistics like forensic phonetics, forensic linguistics etc. He gave special stress of the role of linguistics in communication, speech pathology, multilingual education, addressing the problems of linguistic minorities, computer-aided language learning, cognitive linguistics, neurolinguistics etc. Prof. C.
