48th ALL INDIA CONFERENCE OF DRAVIDIAN LINGUISTS

Since the COVID-19 situation in Kerala has not vet come down to a satisfactory level, both Prof. R.C. Sharma, the President of the Dravidian Linguistic Association of India and Prof. K. Karunakaran, the Chairman of the International School of Dravidian Linguistics have pointed out that, based on the prevailing situation in Kerala, it is not safe to hold the AICDL at Thiruvananthapuram in the near future. Prof. Karunakaran has informed that he will enquire about the feasibility of holding the 48th AICDL at Bharathiyar University, Coimbatore, with the University authorities. If the response is positive, we hope that the 48th AICDL can be held at Coimbatore within a few months, most probably not later than the third week of February 2022.

GLIMPSES ON DLA

DLA Research Centre at S.V. University

Sree Venkateswara University had played a significant role in the development of the Dravidian Linguistic Association of India by allotting a spacious hall to the DLA at the S.V. University campus for pursuing the research work of the Senior and Junior Fellows of the DLA. It was due to the farsightedness of the Vice-Chancellor Dr. D. Jagannatha Reddy. The DLA offered fellowships to scholars and posted them to work there on subjects related to Dravidian Linguistics until the formation of the International School of Dravidian Linguistics at Menamkulam.

Thiruvananthapuram, Accordingly, well-known scholars like Prof. T.P. Meenakshisundaram and Prof. K.N. Ezhuthachan were appointed as senior fellows with two junior fellows Sri. G.V. Natarajan and N. Rajendran to assist them at the S.V. University campus of the DLA. The fellows produced valuable reports viz., Foreign Models in Tamil Grammar and the History of Malayalam Grammar.

Second All India Conference of Dravidian Linguists

The second All India Conference of Dravidian Linguists was held on 26th and 27th June 1972 at Sree Venkateswara University, Tirupati, the abode of Lord Venkateswara. Dr. G.N. Reddy, Professor of Telugu had undertaken the responsibility of organizing the conference and Prof. K. Mahadeva Sastri looked after the arrangements.

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Inaugural Function of the 2nd AICDL

The inaugural session of the conference began with a welcome speech by Dr. D. Jagannatha Reddy, the Vice-Chancellor of S.V. University. He elaborately discussed the language situation prevailed in India during that period. Followed by the welcome speech, Sri. K.K. Shah, the Hon. Governor of Tamil Nadu inaugurated the conference. He in his address remembered the contributions made by the great Tamil scholar Tolkaappiyanaar and his monumental work *Tolkaappiyam* and also the contributions of other grammarians such as Iraivanar Pavananthi Munivar, Guna Sagarar, Amirta Sagarar, Budda Mittiram, Gunaveera Pandithar, Subramanya Veedigar, Vaidyanatha Navalar, Sivagnana Yogikal and commentators like Parimal Alagar and Senavaraivar. He also mentioned about the Vedas and the co-existence of Dravidian and Sanskrit, Indian linguistics tradition, Indian Fine Arts etc. Prof. T.P. Meenakshisundaram in his presidential address fairly discussed the origin and development of the field of linguistics. The inaugural function came to an end with a vote of thanks by Dr. G.N. Reddy.

Academic Sessions

More than 170 delegates from all over India and abroad participated in the conference. The foreign delegates included Mrs. F. Sjoberg and Ian R. Smith of USA, Michael Garman of UK, Dr. Miss Brenda and E.F. Beck of Canada. Many of the Indian Universities and prestigious institutions like Sahitya Akademi, Telugu Academy and Central Institute of Indian Languages deputed delegates for the conference. It has created among scholars and researchers great interest and enthusiasm. About 100 papers covering various subjects such as loanwords, place name studies, phonology and

morphology of Dravidian languages, dialect study, linguistic interpretation of traditional grammars and texts, general linguistics, contrastive linguistics and applied linguistics were presented and discussed.

Suggestions in the Conference

The conference adopted a blueprint for Dravidian linguistic studies for the consideration of the Planning Commission of India. It was drafted and submitted under the Chairmanship of Prof. T.P. Meenakshisundaram. A proposal to publish the ancient grammars and texts in the four major Dravidian languages with English summary was mooted by the former Maharaja of Travancore Sri. Balarama Varma. The conference souvenir consisting of valuable articles was also released.

SALUTATION TO A GREAT SCHOLAR

Lakshminarayanapuram Viswanatha Aiyar Ramaswami Aiyar (25th October 1895 – 31st January 1948) (affectionately known as L.V.R.) was an Assistant Professor who taught English at the Maharaja's College, Ernakulam from 1922 to 1947. He was a polyglot and had a special interest in Dravidian langu-



ages. Apart from Malayalam and Tamil, Kodagu, Tulu, Kannada, Kui, Gondi, Brahui and Kurukh are the Dravidian languages on which L.V.R. published notes, reviews and queries. It was L.V.R. who paved the way for scientific studies on Malayalam by observing the methods of Linguistics. As a native speaker of Malayalam, he cleverly explained the phonological and morphological features especially through his books entitled *Evolution of Malayalam Morphology* (1936) and *A Primer of Malayalam Phonology* (1937). It is quite interesting to note that L.V.R. wrote almost all of his papers on the Dravidian family while he was in his thirties.

Sunitikumar Chatterji, the doyen of Indian Linguistics was the first person to identify the linguistic skills hidden in the personality of L.V. Ramaswami Aiyar which were evidenced through the notes appeared in the issues of Education Reviews published from Madras. Overwhelmed by the scientific insight of L.V.R. in the description of phonetics and phonology, S.K. Chatterji encouraged the young scholar to write and publish them in magazines and journals. With the initiatives of S.K. Chatterji, L.V.R. prepared A Brief Account of Malayalam Phonetics (1925) and S.K. Chatterji published it in the journal of the University of Calcutta. Ramaswami Aiyar was the first Malayalam linguist who understood the importance of spoken forms in the study of phonological and morphological features of a given language. His studies on the phonology of Malayalam revealed the exact phonetic values of certain phonemes.

L.V. Ramaswami Aiyar's contribution to Dravidian linguistics was purely a labour of love. He obtained no encouragement from any source. In Kerala, he did not get much recognition due to the medium he chose for writing. He mainly wrote in magazines and research journals such as *Quarterly Journal of Mythic Society* (QJMS), *Indian Antiquary* (IA), *Journal of Oriental Research* (JORM), *Bulletin of the School of African and Oriental Studies* (BSOAS), *Bulletin of Ramavarma Research Institute* (BRVRI) and *Indian Linguistics* (IL). He enjoyed recognition in foreign countries like France, England, Czech Republic and USA. His works include books and several research papers (nearly 200) published in national and international journals.

The Dravidian Linguistic Association of India (DLA) from the period of its very inception gave attention to publish the papers of L.V.R. through its journal *International Journal of Dravidian Linguistics*. *Pioneers in Linguistics* published by ISDL in 1978 appreciated the contributions of L.V.R. to Dravidian linguistics. The Folkloristic museum constructed in the ISDL campus was named after L.V. Ramaswami Aiyar.

L.V.R. died at the age of 53 (31st January 1948). Though DLA arranged seminars to celebrate the 125th birthday of L.V.R. which fell on 25th October 2020, the emergence of triple lockdown due to COVID-19 pandemic forced us to give up the entire programme. Pandemic restrictions still prevail, so ISDL took

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initiative to publish the available papers of L.V.R. and that work is progressing satisfactorily. We expect to release it in this academic year itself.

HISTORIC ANNOUNCEMENT BY TAMIL NADU CHIEF MINISTER

Mr. M.K. Stalin, Hon. Chief Minister of Tamil Nadu, announced in the Tamil Nadu Assembly on Thursday the 9th September that joint ventures with neighbouring states and other countries will be undertaken with the Archaeology Departments and researchers of those states and countries from where the remnants of ancient Tamil civilization were obtained. The proposed joint studies will be conducted in important sites like Pattanam (ancient port of Musiri) in Kerala, Vengi in Andhra Pradesh,

Thalaikadu in Karnataka and Palur in Odisha. Similarly, studies will be undertaken at Ouseir al-Oadim and Pernica Anekke in Egypt as well as in Khor Rori in Oman from where "potsherds with Tamil scripts have been found in these countries". The Hon. Chief Minister further announced that studies would also be conducted in Southeast Asian countries such as Indonesia, Thailand, Malaysia and Vietnam where King Rajendra Chola had established supremacy. The above declarations were made in connection with the reporting of carbon dating analysis of rice with soil, found in a burial urn at Sivakalai in Thoothukudi district in Southern Tamil Nadu. The Miami-based Beta Analytic Testing Laboratory has fixed the date of the above findings as 1155 BCE, thereby indicating that the Thamirabarani civilization (the civilization of the Tamraparni river valley of Southern Tamil Nadu) dates back to 3200 years.

DR. P. SOMASEKHARAN NAIR MEMORIAL LECTURE

Dr. M. Sreenathan, Professor of Linguistics, Thunchath Ezhuthachan Malayalam University has delivered this year's *Dr. P. Somasekharan Nair Memorial Lecture* at ISDL on Tuesday 28th September 2021. Prof. Sreenathan paid tribute to his former teacher and highlighted the contributions of Dr. Somasekharan Nair in the field of tribal language studies, dialect survey



conducted by the Department of Linguistics, University of Kerala, dialect studies such as the Cochin Dialect of Malayalam, Paniya Bhasha and the analysis of various spoken languages in a new perspective which gave a fresh impetus to linguistic studies. His book on dialectology attracted students and scholars alike.

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Prof. Sreenathan observed that the new awareness in linguistic studies created by Dr. Somasekharan Nair and others could not continue further which proved to be a great loss to Malayalam. He also focused on the lexicographical works initiated by Dr. Somasekharan Nair and opined that they did not get the desired attention. Linguistic studies conducted in tribal languages before and after Dr. Somasekharan Nair were reviewed in the speech. A brief enumeration of the studies in other areas such as phonology, morphology and syntax of tribal languages was also made. Prof. Sreenathan expressed the view that the works of dialectology which were stalled should be continued in their true spirit and enthusiasm which would be the best tribute to the great memories of Dr. P. Somasekharan Nair.

Prof. Naduvattom Gopalakrishnan, Director, ISDL welcomed the gathering and also presided over the meeting. Prof. G.K. Panikkar, former Director, ISDL and Dr. M. Rama, former Director, ISDL also spoke on the occasion. Dr. Abdul Samed, Treasurer, ISDL extended the vote of thanks.

PROF. PROBAL DASGUPTA RECEIVES THE VIDYASAGAR-DINAMOYEE AWARD OF THE GOVERNMENT OF WEST BENGAL

The 2020-2021 *Vidyasagar-Dinamoyee Prize* is awarded by the Government of West Bengal to Prof. Probal Dasgupta, a well-known Indian linguist by considering his lifetime achievements.

Probal Dasgupta, educated at Sanskrit College (Kolkata), Deccan College (Pune) and New York University (USA) taught linguistics at the University of Calcutta, Deccan College, the University of Hyderabad and the Indian Statistical Institute, Kolkata from which he retired in 2018. His publications pertaining to linguistics include *The Otherness of English: India's Auntie Tongue Syndrome* (1993), Explorations in Indian Sociolinguistics (with Jayant Lele and Rajendra Singh, 1995), After Etymology: Towards a Substantivist Linguistics (with Alan Ford and Rajendra Singh, 2000), Inhabiting Human Languages: The Substantivist Visualization (2012), Kathaar Kriyaakarma ('the activities of words', 1987), Chinna Kathaay Saajaaye Tarani ('on a boat bedecked with broken words', 2011), Bhaashaar Bindubisarga

('dotting the i's and crossing the t's of language', 2012), *Merur Praarthanaa: Bishuber Uttar* ('the poles pray: the equator responds', 2015). Professor Dasgupta has been an honorary member of the Linguistic Society of America (LSA) since 2004.

The paper on "Phonological analysis of Rampuri Urdu" by Nazish Malik and Shabana Hameed provides a phonological sketch of Urdu as spoken in the city of Rampur, Uttar Pradesh where they briefly describe some phonological features, process and pattern, specially aphaeresis, epenthesis, deletion and syllabic structure. Further, the occurrence of frequent gemination of consonants, deletion of /h/ in the middle and final position, addition of nasalization in words, shift from monophthong to diphthong are some significant features of Rampuri Urdu which make it differ from the standard Urdu. Zoya Khalid in her paper "Pronouns and clitic doubling in Asur: A north Munda language" describes the features of Asur pronouns. In this paper, different types of pronouns have been discussed such as personal pronouns, demonstratives, reflexive pronouns, reciprocal pronouns, possessive pronouns, interrogative pronouns and relative pronouns. Further, this paper also discusses the subject and object marker encliticization and the phenomenon of clitic doubling.

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DR. A.P. ANDREWSKUTTY MEMORIAL LECTURE

Dr. A.P. Andrewskutty Memorial Lecture was delivered on 7th October 2021 at ISDL campus, Menamkulam by Prof. C.R. Prasad, HOD, Department of Kerala Studies, University of Kerala.
