The Dravidian Linguistic Association of India was registered under the Travancore-Kochi Literary, Scientific and Charitable Societies Registration Act XII of 1955. It was registered on the 13th of August 1971 (No. S 59 of 1971).

1. Name

- (ii) to provide an academic environment suitable for research including a library and other equipment and undertake and promote advanced research and publications in Dravidian Linguistic Studies and allied fields, training scholars for the purpose wherever necessary;
- (iii) to undertake surveys and evaluate studies on behalf of other academic agencies or Governmental bodies in Dravidian and allied fields;

REVIEW. Aligarh Journal of Linguistics (AJL) 2020-21

The issue 2 of AJL comprises 11 research papers from diverse disciplines including one book review. The first paper entitled "Tense in Koracha" by Basavaraja Kodagunti analyzed the tense system in Koracha and the differences developed in second person in the Koracha speech variety. This variety shows a feature of having two different tense forms for singular and plural in second person. The paper on "The role of dramatic games and its sequence in teaching English vocabularies to young learners" by Khosravi A., Younesi M., Rizwan Khan M., Vahabi S. describes the reliable results by relying on other findings as well as detailed observation of classes that use dramatics in their educational methods as audio-visual aids for teaching. The result of the study was the advancement of language-learners in learning, particularly in the use and application of vocabularies in English. Further, the sequence of the desired dramatic games (i.e., role-playing, simulation, and improvisation) is also notable in this study and has a significant impact on recognizing and reproducing words, creating a sense of confidence, creativity and motivation. Vijay Kumar Kaul et al in their paper "Online teaching of Hindi vocabulary as a foreign language" explore a framework for teaching Hindi vocabulary as a foreign language vocabulary by combining NLP tools and other cultural and contextual clues. Advances in Natural Language Processing (NLP) have enabled rich tagging and annotation of corpus data, essential for their effective use in language acquisition application.
