Report

(Continued from the September issue)

The third technical session chaired by Prof. G.K. Panikkar commenced at 2 PM with the opening presentation by Dr. T. Chandrachoodan on the *Language of Kūṭiyāṭṭam-A Short Sociolinguistic Study*. Kūṭiyāṭṭam represents the synthesis of Sanskrit classicism and the local traditions of Kerala. The presentation revolved around the core concepts of the codified language of Kūṭiyāṭṭam in the form of gestures, netra abhinaya and hasta abhinaya. The second presentation was by Dr. Deepa Mary Joseph on *Grammar and Society – A Sociolinguistic Perspective on Kēraḷa Pāṇinīyam*. The presentation touched on and aroused a discussion on the core perspectives put forward by Kēraḷa Pāṇinīyam. The next presentation was on the *Tulu Cognate Dictionary – a review* by Dr. Sayeegeetha & Dr. Padmanabha Kekunnaya. The presentation was highly informative for the young scholars to understand the Tulu language and its Dravidian cognates. The paper provided a complete outline of the Tulu cognate dictionary. The fourth paper was *Cross-Lingual Influence - A Case Study of Malayalam and Markodi Language* by Dr. Jayan V. The study brought into discussion the Markodi language used by the Mavilan tribes of Kasargod and its Malayalam cross-lingual influences. The session ended with a presentation on the Study of the stylistic profiling of the Text by Mrs. Sruthi T.S. The paper exemplified the qualitative and quantitative methods of carrying out stylistic analysis using sample text data.

A parallel session in the Research Hall, Department of Linguistics, was chaired by Prof. Mahidas Bhattacharya. There were two presentations in that session. Keerthana K.S. and Dr. Syam S.K. presented *An Introductory Study on Pronunciation Variations among Post Graduate Students - A Reference to the Socio-phonetic Approach*. Dr. K. Umaraj and Lakshmi Prabha presented a paper on *Developing the sentiment analysis tool to evaluate YouTube comments automatically*. The study discussed the issues while developing the sentiment analysis tool.

The second parallel session in the Research Hall, Department of Linguistics was chaired by Prof. A.G. Menon. There was only one presentation in that session. Abhijith N. Arjunan presented a paper on *Standardisation of Malayalam and Language Attitudes: Representation of Speech Communities in Northern Kerala*. This paper attempted to analyze how the language standardization process of the Malayalam language and how the creation of the Standard Language Ideologies have been legitimized. It also discussed the existing language attitudes within the region and the ways of propagating the core ideas through multiple channels.

The third session was chaired by Dr. Sudeep Ben. There were six presentations in this session.

Dr. Arun Behera presented a paper on *Technology and its Impact on Language Teaching and Learning*. This paper was an attempt to give a comprehensive review of the literature on this topic which includes the studies that have investigated the use of various types of technology in language learning, such as computer-assisted language learning (CALL) and mobile-assisted language learning (MALL). Dr. Bipasha Patgiri's presentation was on *A Generative Account of Foot Structure and Metrification*. The paper explored prosody-related phenomena such as syllable structure, foot formation, syncope, stress shift, vowel coalescence and diphthong formation in the Nalbaria variety of Assamese,

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(an Eastern Indic language spoken in Assam, India) and their interactive consequences.

Dr. G. Renuka Devi and Ms. Ruchika Chug presented a combined paper on *Spelling Error Analysis made by Elementary School English Learners*. This study tried to identify the spelling errors made by the students of grade VI and the sources and proposed measures and strategies to reduce spelling errors. Dr. Jayashree Aanand Gajjam presented her paper *The Insights of Phenomenology in Bhartrhari's Vākyapadīya*. This paper attempted to discover the ideas on phenomenology in Bhartrhari's *Vākyapadīya* with utmost care. This paper helps to advance our understanding of ancient texts with modern methods of enquiry. Dr. Dhananjay Kumar Tiwari, presented his paper *Plain Language Movement in Judiciary: An Examination*. This article attempted to discuss the investigation of the historical development of the plain language movement and its efficacy in the legal system. Examining the background of the movement, he showed the recent development of the plain language movement. The hidden forces that criticize the movement have been brought to light. It also exposed the forces that oppose any kind of linguistic liberalism in the legal system. The last presentation was made by Dr. Venkanna Ithagani on *Interpretation of Proverbs: A Semantic Study*. This paper studies the meaning of proverbs from the semantic perspective and finds out that the meaning of the proverb is not concerned with the words and sentences, rather it depends upon the shared knowledge and the context in which it is used.

The fourth session is chaired by Dr. Palani Rajan. There were six presentations in that session. Fathima M. and Irfana M. presented their paper on *Factors Affecting L3 Immediate and Serial Recall*. This study highlighted the importance of different cues that can be used while teaching a new language. It also showed that L3 shows a similar pattern of L2 acquisition and exposure to the language has a greater effect than the similarity of the previous language to a multi-language learner. Dr. Duggirala Vasanta presented a paper on *Aksharas and Orthographic Neighbours: Observations Based on the CILL's Telugu Text Corpus*. This article describes certain structural features associated with the modern-day Telugu script classified as an abugida. Some of the principles governing the formation of consonant and vowel aksharas, vowel modifying diacritics and ligatures involved in representing geminate and consonant clusters in a script are described.

Dr. Denish Raja Durai presented a paper on *Operative ways to teach Knowledge Texts Translation (KTT) in the language classroom: A study*. The present study analyzes the problems of translation and

recommends a method to improve knowledge of text translation activities in language classrooms, that follow the steps of pre-translation, while-translation, and post-translation activities. Poonam Biruly presented a paper on *Compounds in the Ho language*. This paper addresses the productivity and varieties of compounding present in Ho. It also tries to test the data by applying the lexical structure theory of Lieber. Jyoti Kumari and Namrata Paul presented a joint paper on *Changing Trends of Grooming Products' Advertisements in India: A Study of Gender Metaphors*. The paper tries to analyze the metaphors used in advertisements. As the target domain of the gender metaphors became more abstract, the style of the advertisements also changed to narratives with authentic storylines of gender stereotypes. The last presentation was made by Roshin A.R. on *Word order and Malayalam*.

The delegates rejoined for the endowment lectures at the Smart Classroom, School of Distance Education at 3.20 p.m. The session had three endowment lectures delivered by the senior linguists of our country. Prof. A. Chandra Shekhar's endowment lecture was chaired by Prof. S.Kunjamma and was to be delivered by Prof. Naduvattom Gopalakrishnan. In his absence, Prof. G.K. Panikkar presented the paper handed over by Prof. Naduvattom Gopalakrishnan titled *The First Scientific Study of Malayalam Inscriptions*. The deliberation provided a complete outline of Malayalam grammatical evolution. Prof. K. Mahdeva Sastri endowment lecture was delivered by Prof. N. Bhakthavathsala Reddy, and chaired by Prof. M. Rama. The talk provided a complete sketch of the life and contribution of Prof. Sastri. The last lecture of the second day was Prof. H.M. Maheswaraiiah endowment lecture which was delivered by Prof. A. Murigeppa. He discussed artificial intelligence, the application of linguistics in chat GPT and the merits and demerits of generative network technology. After the technical session, at 5.30 PM the members of DLA met for the General Body meeting of the Dravidian Linguistic Association of India.

ONLINE LECTURE**The Ancient Brahui Script**

An online lecture on ‘The Ancient Brahui Script’ organized by ISDL was held on 28th September 2023, at the Seminar Hall, Rabindra Bhavan, ISDL, Thiruvananthapuram. This was the first lecture of the three lecture series on Brahui by Dr. Nazir Shakir Brahui, Director, Brahui Research Institute, Sindh, Pakistan.

The lecture started at 10.30am with a welcome address by Dr. N. Muraleedharan Nair (Treasurer, ISDL). The first lecture was on the topic entitled ‘Brahui script: Past to Present’. Dr. Nazir Shakir Brahui mentioned the four main ways of studying any Script. They are linguistic method, orthographic study, method of un-deciphered script to decipher and historical method. In this lecture, he addresses the historical study of Brahui language. He has stated that Brahui language and Sumerian language are greatly associated with each other and listed some basic vocabularies that show their association. He mentioned the books written in Brahui language like ‘Khidmat-e-deen’(1292) ‘Majhoo-lul-ism’ (1393) etc. He explained that by the end of 19th century Brahui language was written in four scripts like Sindhi script, Arabic or Naskh script, Roman script and Perso-Arabic-Urdu or Nastaleek script. He also mentioned about the linguists and their works on the Brahui language. Many researchers and senior linguists attended the seminar through online mode not only from India but also from countries like Pakistan, Japan, Netherlands etc. The lecture was very much informative. After the presentation lively discussions followed. Many relevant questions were asked by the participants for which Dr. Nazir Shakir Ahmed gave convincing replies. The informative lecture came to an end with the vote of thanks proposed by Dr. Jeena S. Nair.

The International School of Dravidian Linguistics organized a one-day ‘Symposium on Syntactic Convergence’ on October 6, 2023, at Rabindra Bhavan Seminar Hall in the V.I. Subramaniam Memorial ISDL Complex, Thiruvananthapuram. The divergent perspectives on syntactic convergence were discussed by the subject experts. There were two sessions with two topics. The program started at 11 a.m. with an invocation to almighty followed by a welcome address by Dr. Soumya S.R. (JRF, ISDL). The presidential address was delivered by Prof. G.K. Panikkar, Director, ISDL. He gave an introduction to the programme and divergent perspectives on syntactic convergences. The keynote address was given by Dr. Abhinav Kumar Mishra, Head, Department of Linguistics, Banaras Hindu University, Varanasi. His lecture was on “Contact and Syntactic Convergence : A Case Study of Aspects in Maithili”. The 40th most spoken language in the world, Maithili is an Indo-Aryan language and an apabhramsa of Magadhi. He discussed the linguistic affinity and verbal system of Maithili.

In the second session, Prof. M. Sreenathan, Department of Linguistics, Thunchathu Ezhuthachan Malayalam University, Tirur, delivered a lecture on “Syntactic Diglossia in Malayalam”. He focused on the syntactical structure and semantic interference of Malayalam, along with socio-linguistic arguments, attitude scales, and inclusive hybridity that affect the semantic quality of Malayalam. Following these two lectures, there was an active interactive session that provided the participants with enormous knowledge on various aspects of syntactic convergences. Dr. Aiswaria G. Shajan (JRF, ISDL) proposed the vote of thanks, and the symposium ended at 4.45 p.m.
