#### **SESSION-WISE REPORT**

#### June 29, 2022

On the second day of the 49th All India Conference of Dravidian Linguists and International Symposium, organised by the Department of Linguistics, Faculty of Arts, Banaras Hindu University in collaboration with DLA, CIIL, ICPR, AnSI and VCW, the first parallel session held in Hall A was chaired by Prof. K. Srikumar. Seven research papers were presented during the session displaying studies on a variety of topics. One presented the study of economic principles in language learning in early childhood stages from a Columbia school perspective. While one opened the floor for discussion on the silent spread of Hindi in the South Indian states followed by a proposal for it to act as a link language. One presenter focused on systemic functional linguistics in translation focusing on the translation of Michael Halliday's *An Introduction to Functional Grammar* from English to Telugu. The theoretical linguistic studies presented in the session included a study of Dravidian influences on the Bhalavali variety, a dialect map of Malayalam based on direct and indirect data elicitation and a brief study of grammar and subordination in the Assamese language. A research paper on the study of language usage in Verukal, a Malayalam semi-autobiographical novel written by Malayattoor Ramakrishnan was also presented in the session.

The chair commended the papers on their richness in terms of details and data. The attendees raised many noteworthy points during discussions of the papers. The market decides the usage of language. One attendee appreciated the use of social variety and lexical words in the data gathering for the dialectal map.

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The first parallel session held in Hall B was chaired by Prof. V.M. Subramaniam Sharma, and six research papers focusing on various areas of linguistics were presented. The first paper 'Sarcastic Hindi Newspaper Headlines: A Sentiment Based Study used the Sentimental Analysis (opinion mining) Approach and focused on Pragmatics. The Second paper 'The Lexical and Semantic Aspect of the Problems of Lacunarity in the Construction of the Bhojpuri Net' highlighted that the availability of Bhojpuri synset would promote technological awareness in a minor language. Thus focusing on Digitalization and Machine translation i.e., NLP. The third paper 'MWEs in Khortha: An Endangered Language of Jharkhand'. It was a descriptive study approaching the language in aspects of theoretical linguistics, especially morphology. The fourth paper 'Linguistic Divergence in Telugu-Urdu based on Dorr's Divergence' was a comparative study where various lexical-semantic divergences, as well

as semantic divergences in the two languages, were noted. The paper finds relevance in Machine Translation under NLP. The next paper 'Error Analysis of Hindi Speaking students as Japanese Language learners: Some postpositional Aspects' was a precise paper of Applied Linguists dealing with second language teaching. The influence of L1 on the learning of L2 was noticed and it was noticed that similarity in syntax does not promise similarity in every grammar pattern. The final paper 'Comparative Study of Light Verbs in Tamil And Tulu' provided etymological Comparative data.

The Chair remarked that the papers were precise, insightful, informative and well researched in their respective linguistic domains.

The second parallel session on the second day of the 49th All India Conference of Dravidian Linguists and International Symposium held in Hall A, was chaired by Dr Tariq Khan. Six papers based on applied linguistics were presented in the session. One paper analysed the language data collected from suicide notes to study suicidal ideation and post-traumatic stress disorder in cyberbullying victims from a forensic linguistics point of view. Two papers were based on language and law. Of which one discussed the salutatory terms in the Indian legal system provisioned by the Bar Council of India, their origins and aversions to their use. The other examined the validity of writing witness statements in diglossic language for legal processing. One paper discussed the language development in human beings and where it is innate or acquired. One presenter put forth his study of language disorders, therapy and the role linguists play in it. The research paper studied the processing of argument structure and information status using the reading aloud paradigm.

The chair remarked that the session was composite and suggested further research in the areas proposed in the sessions.

The evening session was chaired by Prof. Prasannanshu, and six research papers focusing on multiple areas of Core linguistics were presented by scholars from all over the nation. The first paper 'Morpho- Syntactic Study of Ahirwarti Language' presented a detailed introduction of the Hindi variant language spoken in parts of Haryana and Rajasthan. A detailed phonetic inventory and lexical data was provided. The second paper 'Morpho-Syntactic Differences Between Kakrala-Urdu and Urdu/Hindi' was a comparative study, it was observed that Kakrala Urdu has gender-based IIIrd person pronouns while Hindi has just one pronoun. The third paper 'Comparative Analysis of Alphabetical Order of Languages' focused on world scripts. The fourth paper 'The Stylistic

Features of Hindi Newspaper Headlines' was applied linguistics based next paper was 'Online Lexical Resources in Tamil: Present and Future' emphasised the technological areas of linguistics, The final paper was 'Tulu in Lexicography' which focused on applied aspects of linguistics.

The Chair appreciated the academically motivated and rich session, suggestions were made for further research in the areas proposed in the sessions.

#### June 30, 2022

The ultimate session of the final day of the 49<sup>th</sup> All India Conference of Dravidian Linguists and International Symposium was conducted in the online mode parallelly with the offline session. Due to the online nature, two sessions chaired by Prof. S. A. Shanavas and Prof. Arulmozi were conducted back to back. The research papers showed a variety in language and the study method. Topics from Theoretical Linguistics varied from the contrastive analysis of fricative sounds in Bengali and Tamil, the grammaticalisation of verb annu "to say" in Kannada, and noun modifying expressions in Hillpulaya language in the first session to morphosyntactic features of structural case in Malayalam, verb paradigms morphophonemic variations in Telangana Telugu, and a brief study of grammar and meaning of subordination in Assamese among others in the second session. The papers with topics from applied linguistics focused on topics like neuroimaging, machine learning methods, performance in the second language, linguistic analysis of texts in social media discussions and a study of sensitive words in the movies of Lijo Jose Pellissery. The chair in both sessions commended the variety in the topics of research papers and suggested further research areas for some presenters.

On the final day of the 49th All India Dravidian Conference of Linguists and International Symposium organised the Department of Linguistics, Faculty of Arts, Banaras Hindu University in collaboration with DLA, CIIL, ICPR, AnSI and VCW, the first parallel session held in Hall B(offline mode) was Amit chaired by Dr. Kumar Ghosh, Anthropological Survey of India. A total of eight papers were presented dealing with an array of topics from both Theoretical and Applied Linguistics. Three papers out of the eight talked about Malayalam - A Dravidian language, where the first 'West Coast Dialect: Malayalam in Early Foreign Notes' discussed the Graeco-Roman geographers use of Malayalam words while writing about their expeditions to the coastal state, the second one 'Malayalam Past Markers in Non Past Context' discussed both morphological and

syntactic aspects and the third paper 'From Prescription to Description: The Grammar of Malayalam language through centuries' threw light on various Malayalam Grammars. There were two papers discussing endangered languages, While the first one was a pilot study of Jurai, a critically endangered language spoken in Odisha. The paper was a commentary that looked at the last stage of language endangerment from the native speaker's perspective. Another paper 'Affixation in Khortha: An Endangered Language of Jharkhand' also provided data on theoretical lines of linguistics, in this regard; Morphology. A paper titled 'A Comparative Study of Person, Number and Gender in Hindi and German' The final paper of the session was one about Forensic linguistics, titled 'Stylometric Analysis in Forensic Linguistics Investigation of Digital Texts: A brief study on Punctuation Marker (.) fullstop.

The session was followed by audience interaction, and the Chair's remarks. The chair emphasised that one must take pride in their personal dialects and gave example of Shonpe a Nicobarese language, towards which the Chair has extensively worked.

#### June 29, 2022

#### **Endowment Lecture 4:**

#### Prof. Shivendra K. Verma Memorial Lecture

Prof. Shivendra K. Verma Memorial Endowment Lecture, was chaired by Prof. Prasannanshu. Prof. Shyamala Sasidharan presented the attendees with 'Glimpse into the Global relevance of Modern English Today'. The presenter spoke about language connecting the world. The presenter expanded on the emergence of English as an international language. The paper opened up for a very interesting debate between the presenter and the attendees. The opposing viewpoints of both sides with reference of English being referred to as a global language put forth some thought-provoking points like the globalization of

any language is due to its invasion among nonspeakers. The chair encouraged the debate but also mentioned that the way in which a language is studied is what matters.

#### **Endowment Lecture 5:**

#### Prof. Chekkuri Rama Rao Lecture

In the evening session of endowment lectures on the second day of the 49th All India Conference of Dravidian Linguists and International Symposium, two very interesting topics were addressed. In the absence of Prof. Panchanan Mohanty, on his behalf Prof. Arul Mozi took over the presentation during the Prof. Chekkuri Rama Rao endowment lecture chaired by Prof. A. Usha Devi. The presentation, 'Why Language Matters in the Literary Space', opened up the ground for some very interesting discussion among the attendees and the chair. The chair spoke about Prof. Rama Rao's contribution to traditional Telugu grammar and how Chomskian model is applicable to traditional grammar. One of attendees also mentioned the various translations of the story 'The Giving Tree' and words selected, grammatical way of the forms chosen, change in generational speech as the young boy from the story grows into an old man. While yet another attendee put forth the suggestion of including Stylistics as a course for students studying linguistics.

# Endowment Lecture 6: Prof. A. Chandrasekhar Memorial Lecture

In the next endowment lecture, Prof. A. Chandrasekhar Memorial Lecture, of the same session, chaired by Prof. M. S. #### Conclusion

It is disappointing to note that such a rich heritage of words with historical and social significance have completely disappeared from Malayalam in the flux of the social and political changes that followed. Coins such as the ones mentioned above referred in the Matilakam records have been forgotten totally in line with their predecessors putuvarāhan, putupponnaccu, puttan paṇam etc. and their followers cakṛam, kāśu, aṇa, nayāpaisa etc. Many Malayalam words as the ones referred above found in earlier records are not intelligible to even educated Malayalam speakers of today.
