

BRAHUI TEXTS

By LIAQUAT ALI AND MASATO KOBAYASHI

This book contains Brahui materials on Language, Literature, Fiction, Folklore, texts with interlinear glosses and English parallel translations.

Despite facing endangerment due to lack of official recognition and societal changes, Brahui continues to flourish as a language with over three million L1 or L2 speakers, and there are a considerable number of published literary works in this language such as poems, novels and short stories. But most Brahui books are written in the Perso-Arabic script, which does not consistently represent vowels and geminated consonants, making it difficult for non-Brahui speakers to read, according to the authors. This problem is overcome in this book by Masato Kobayashi and Liaquat Ali.

The present work is published by Research Institute for Languages and Cultures of Asia and Africa (ILCAA), Tokyo University of Foreign Studies, and printed by Nihon Root Printing Publishing Co. Ltd. The academic community is very much indebted to the authors for placing this book consisting of very valuable research materials in the public domain so as to enable the researchers to pursue further research on Brahui related topics.

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AICLF-10 HIGHLIGHTS

CULTURAL AND LINGUISTIC DIMENSIONS OF TRANSLATION

The inaugural day of the 10th Annual International Conference on Language and Linguistics (AICLF) at Aligarh Muslim University commenced with a series of discussions that underscored the cultural and linguistic complexities inherent in translation practices across India. The event, hosted by Aligarh Muslim University (AMU), brought together scholars, academics, and practitioners from across the nation to explore the challenges and rewards of translation in a multilingual society.

The three-day Conference of Linguistics and Folklore on "Translation across Cultures in Multilingual India with respect to NEP 2020", hosted by the Department of Linguistics, Aligarh Muslim University (AMU), in collaboration with the Punjabi Linguistics Association, Patiala, the Central



Institute of Indian Languages, Mysuru and the Ministry of Culture, Government of India, began with the AMU Vice Chancellor, Prof Naima Khatoon presiding over the inaugural function.

In her presidential remarks, Prof. Naima Khatoon stressed the need to view translation not just as a process but as a tool for promoting inclusivity and equity in a multilingual society. She stated that translation supports the objectives of National Education Policy (NEP) 2020 by facilitating the spread of knowledge and protecting linguistic diversity in the country.

She called for innovative approaches and expertise to advance the field of translation and nurture a multilingual society.

Delivering the inaugural address virtually, the guest speaker, Shri S. K. Barnwal (IAS), Additional Secretary, Ministry of Education, Government of India, emphasized the importance of promoting multilingualism through mother tongue, which has been made a cornerstone of the NEP.



He noted that language is not merely a means of communication but a repository of knowledge and culture, which is especially crucial for a linguistically diverse country like India. He also underscored the importance of translation across cultures for societal development and recognized its role in enriching national education, historical values and helping in carving good policies and schemes.

Another guest speaker, Shri Vipin Kumar (IAS), Additional Secretary, Ministry of Education, Government of India virtually addressed the participants, and emphasized the importance of preserving regional languages in India.

He highlighted the need for inclusivity in education and underscored the role of conference in fostering cultural understanding and celebrating the linguistic diversity. He advocated for the promotion of multilingualism through translation.

Prof. Harish Narang, while delivering the keynote address, underscored linguistics as a foundational discipline essential for humanity even more than mathematics and science. Emphasizing the crucial role of language in human communication and identity, he stressed that preserving language is vital for maintaining our sense of self.

With reference to India's rich multilingual landscape, Prof. Narang expressed optimism about achieving significant strides in developing India into a more accommodating society by promoting multilingualism through translation.

Earlier, welcoming the guest speakers, Prof. M. J. Warsi, Chairman, Department of Linguistics, highlighted the crucial role of translation in a linguistically diverse country like India, where it has historically served as a bridge between people. He acknowledged the importance of NEP 2020, noting both its essential nature and the challenges it presents.

Prof. Bhupinder Singh Khaira, President, Punjabi Linguistics Association highlighted the broad linguistic impact of the Punjabi language and emphasized that the Punjabi Linguistics Association represents not only Punjab but all regions where Punjabi is spoken, thus promoting a harmonious integration of culture and heritage throughout the country.

The Dean, Faculty of Arts, Prof. Arif Nazir acknowledged the crucial role of language and translation in India's educational framework. He noted India's rich history of translation and the importance of grammar, vocabulary, literature, and translation in language learning.

The highlight of the inaugural session was the announcement of two prestigious Awards by Dr. Suman Preet Virk, Secretary Punjabi Linguistics Association, Patiala, **the Pannini Ratan Award-2024**, which was conferred upon **Professor G K Panikkar**, Hony. Director, ISDL and **M B Emeneau Scholar of Excellence Award-2024**, which was conferred upon **Prof M J Warsi**, Aligarh Muslim University, Aligarh in recognition of their significant contributions to linguistics and culture.

The other five books are the following: "The Journal of Faculty of Arts", "Crafting Resources for Language Pedagogy in the Digital Era" by M J Warsi and Nazrin B Laskra, Prof. Khaira's "Semiotics and Narrative of Punjab", Prof. Rana Nayar's "Corona Chronicles" and Prof. M.J. Warsi's "Jadeed Lisaniyaat aur Urdu Adab".

Dr. Suman Preet from Punjabi University, Patiala extended the vote of thanks.

Plenary-I Session was presided over by Prof. Pradeep K. Das, Head of the Department of Linguistics at Jawaharlal Nehru University (JNU), and moderated by Prof. Shabana Hameed from AMU. The session was held in the University Polytechnic Auditorium at AMU, Aligarh. The session featured a plenary address by Prof. Rana Nayar, from the Department of English and Cultural Studies at Punjab University, Chandigarh. Prof. Nayar's talk, titled "Theorizing Translation: Locating Newer Tropes in the Indian Context," critically examined the dominance of Western translation theories in Indian Translation Studies. Prof. Nayar advocated for the development of Indian-specific translation theories and introduced the concept of 'Kayakalpa' as a potential alternative. Mr. Parvesh Sharma, former Joint Director of Media and Communication, shared his experiences in a talk titled "Border Crossing Across Languages: Challenges and Rewards." Mr. Sharma discussed the practical challenges of translation in India's multilingual landscape, particularly focusing on the syntactic and cultural gaps encountered when translating between Punjabi, English, and Hindi. He emphasized the importance of intuition and practice over theory, highlighting how translation serves as a bridge not only between languages but also between cultures.

The first academic session of the day was chaired by Prof. Aejaz Mohammad Sheikh, Head of the Department of Linguistics at the University of Kashmir, Srinagar. This session featured six paper presentations that delved into various aspects of translation, including cross-cultural communication, cultural semiotics in Bengali cuisine, and the challenges of translating idioms and proverbs from Maithili into English. The session also explored sociolinguistic perspectives in translation and the long-term impact of the National Education Policy (NEP) 2020 on translation and education in multilingual India.

The second plenary session was presided over by Prof. Rizwan Khan from the Department of English at AMU and moderated by Mr. Masood Ali Beg, Associate Professor in the Department of Linguistics at AMU. Held in the University Polytechnic Auditorium, the session featured a presentation by Prof. Prasannanshu, Director of the Center for Linguistic Justice and Endangered Languages at National Law University, Delhi (NLUD). His talk, "Wealth of Folk Literatures Locked in Endangered and Lesser-Known Languages of India: Employing Translation as Cultural Bridge," emphasized the importance of preserving endangered languages through translation. Prof. Prasannanshu discussed how translation can serve as a cultural bridge, safeguarding India's rich linguistic heritage and contributing to the Indian Knowledge System (IKS).

Dr. Amitabh Vikram Dwivedi, Associate Professor at the Central Institute of Hindi, Agra, highlighted the importance of linguistic competence and cultural adaptation in achieving accurate and meaningful translations, particularly in the context of NEP 2020's emphasis on mother-tongue instruction.

Day 2 of the conference commenced with the third plenary session, presided over by Prof. Vibha Sharma from AMU's Department of Linguistics and moderated by Dr. Nazrin B. Laskar, Associate Professor in the same department. The session featured talks by Prof. Chandra Mohan Nautiyal from the Birbal Sahni Institute of Palaeosciences, Lucknow, and Prof. Gangadhar Wanodhe, Regional Director of CHI, Agra, Hyderabad Center. The speakers addressed the role of translation in the NEP 2020, with Prof. Wanodhe discussing the implications for Indian languages.

This was followed by parallel academic sessions 2 and 3, chaired respectively by Prof. Pradeep K. Das from JNU and Prof. Abhinav K. Mishra from Banaras Hindu University (BHU). The sessions explored a range of topics, including the application of discourse analysis in text translation, multilingual translation strategies for inclusive education under NEP 2020, and the role of translation in protecting trademarks in multilingual societies. Paper on the topic Pragmatics and Translation: A Complex Interplay was presented by Dr Saleha Zaini.

The fourth plenary session was presided over by Prof. Rana Nayar and moderated by Mr. Masood Ali Beg. The session featured talks by Dr. Vishakha Das and Dr. Abhinav K. Mishra, who explored the intricate roles of translation in cultural and legal contexts. Dr. Das's presentation offered a "thick description" of cultural narratives from lesser-known communities, highlighting the importance of preserving these stories through translation. Dr. Mishra followed with a talk on the significance of translation in forensic linguistics, emphasized the need for accurate translations to preserve cultural and pragmatic aspects in legal contexts. Prof. Nayar commended both speakers for their anthropological approach and the depth of their analyses.

The conference continued with academic sessions 4 and 5, chaired by Prof. Srikumar from the University of Lucknow and Dr. Amitabh Vikram Dwivedi. These sessions featured a total of 11 paper presentations, covering topics such as audio-visual translation, the impact of semiotic structures on translation equivalence, and the translation of Rajasthani folklore.

The final plenary session of the day was presided over by Prof. Rajneesh Arora from CIEFL, Lucknow, and moderated by Abdul Aziz Khan from AMU. The session's speakers, R.C. Sharma discussed the challenges of translating pain across cultures and Prof. K. Srikumar discussed the practice of translating technical terms in Malayalam.

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The day concluded with the final academic sessions 6 and 7, which were chaired by Prof. Bhupinder Singh Khaira, President of the Punjabi Linguistic Association, Patiala, and Mr. Masood Ali Beg. A total of 17 papers were presented, collectively contributing to the ongoing discourse on translation and its role in multillingual and multicultural contexts.

The three-day All India Conference on Linguistics and Folklore (AICLF-10) concluded on September 5. The conference, themed "Translation across Cultures in Multilingual India with respect to NEP 2020," featured academic sessions, plenary talks, and discussions, culminating in a valedictory ceremony.

Chief Guest Smt. Neeta Prasad, IAS, Joint Secretary (IC & Languages), Ministry of Education, Government of India, delivered an online address emphasizing the role of linguistic research in the context of NEP 2020. She discussed the need for innovative approaches to translation and multilingual education, particularly in promoting mother-tongue and regional languages. She also praised the presentation of over 100 academic papers that spurred meaningful dialogue on translation pedagogy. Ms. Prasad highlighted the Ministry's initiatives to promote languages through the Bharatiya Bhasha Samiti and the creation of educational content in more than 300 regional languages across various platforms. She also noted efforts by CBSE, UGC, and AICTE to translate textbooks into multiple Indian languages, fostering multilingualism in education.

In his opening remarks on valedictory ceremony, Prof. M.J. Warsi, Director of AICLF-10, and Chairman of the Department of Linguistics, highlighted the importance of NEP 2020 in unifying translation studies and linguistics, calling for an integrated approach in India's education system. He expressed gratitude to scholars and delegates nationwide and thanked the organizing committee and speakers for their contributions to the conference's success.

Dr. Sadia Husna Hasan, Associate Professor, Department of Linguistics, AMU, presented a comprehensive report summarizing key discussions from the conference. Dr. Bhishaka Sharma, an independent scholar, expressed thanks and appreciation for the technical insights shared throughout the event.

Guest of Honour Prof. R.C. Sharma from the University of Delhi commended the Department of Linguistics for hosting the conference and stressed the importance of preserving literature through translation, positioning India as a global hub for translation studies. Prof. Bhupender Singh Khaira, President of the Punjabi Linguistics Association, proposed future collaboration among linguistic scholars, including a conference on folklore as a language, to be held at Punjab Agricultural University, Ludhiana.

Prof. Arif Nazir, Dean of the Faculty of Arts, praised the participants and organizers for their hard work and reiterated AMU's commitment to advancing linguistic studies. Special recognition was given to Mr. Faizan llahi and Mr. Hisham for their contributions to cultural activities, particularly the music night and photography, by Prof. Arif Nazir.

At the end, Dr. Pallav Vishnu, Associate Professor, Department of Linguistics, delivered the vote of thanks, acknowledging the significance of the event concluding on Teacher's Day.

Telf Celebrated Telugu Language Day

29.08.2024

Telugu Linguists' Forum(TeLF), Hyderabad celebrated Telugu Language Day of Andhra Pradesh state through online mode on 29/08/2024 at 11 am. Gidugu Ramamurti Panthulu's birthday is celebrated as Telugu language day in Andhra Pradesh state. In the past, it was also celebrated as Telugu Language Day in the united Andhra Pradesh. Prof. Parimi Ramanarasimham, Retd. Professor, Department of Telugu, University of Hyderabad, a well-known Telugu Linguist, was the chief guest. Prof. M.C. Keshavamurthy, President, Telugu Linguists' Forum chaired the session. Dr. Praveen Gatla, General Secretary, TeLF welcomed the TeLF office bearers and participants. Prof. M.C. Keshavamurthy briefed the aims and objectives of TeLF. Later, Prof. B. Bhujanga Reddy, Vice-President, TeLF introduced the chief guest.

The Chief Guest, Prof. Parimi Ramanarasimham spoke on the topic Revisiting the Gidugu. In his talk, he said that **Telugu** is the major language in two States viz.. Andhra **Pradesh** Telangana. Besides, it is also spoken as mother tongue by a sizable population in the neighbouring states. The present so called standard language is stamped as the language of central circar districts of present Andhra Pradesh state, and is being looked down by people of other regions, especially Telangana and Rayalaseema. When Gidugu

Ramamurti Pantulu proposed Sishta Vyaavahaarika Bhaasha, he wanted a variety of languages with no regional stamp. the then vyaavahaarika bhaashaa 'colloquial language' propagators did not fully understand Gidugu and used the language spoken by the educated people of central circar districts in all the standard writings. Hence the present antagonism with regard to the present standard language. The speaker proposes two or three regional standard languages for Modern Telugu -- one the present standard language for the circar districts of Andhra Pradesh, the second for Telangana, and the third for Rayalaseema and the variety of Telugu spoken in the bordering areas of Tamilnadu and Karnataka. He further proposes a strategy for pedagogical purposes: local dialect at primary/elementary level, regional dialect at elementary/lower secondary level, and regional standard variety along with an introduction to classical literary language, which is a common heritage of all the Telugu speakers at secondary/higher secondary level.

Lastly, Dr. V.M. Subrahmanya Sharma, Executive Member, TeLF proposed vote of thanks. Distinguished scholars like Prof. A. Usha Devi, Swarajyalakshmi, Prof. M. S. Hayat, Prof. P. Chandrashekhar, Prof. D. Vijayalakshmi and other Telugu Linguists attended the program.

UPCOMING MEMORIAL LECTURES


