50TH ALL INDIA CONFERENCE OF DRAVIDIAN LINGUISTS AND INTERNATIONAL SEMINAR ON CURRENT TRENDS IN LINGUISTICS

SESSION-WISE REPORT


The second day of the 50th All India Conference of Dravidian Linguists and International Seminar on Current Trends in Linguistics organized by the Department of Linguistics, University of Kerala, in collaboration with the Dravidian Linguists Association of India, International School of Dravidian Linguistics, and Central Institute of Indian Languages, Mysore, commenced at 9 AM in the smart classroom, School of Distance Education, University of Kerala, Karyavattom campus. The second day opened with Professor Chekkuri Rama Rao Memorial lecture (online) delivered by Professor K V Subbarao on *Telugu relative clauses*. The session was chaired by Prof. Aejaz Muhammed Sheikh. The lecture was highly informative for young scholars. The participants interacted with the speaker and that made the session highly useful. The technical sessions started at 9.45 AM at the four allotted venues of the conference viz., Main Venue Smart Classroom, School of Distance Education, University of Kerala; Multimedia Classroom, Department of Linguistics; Researchers' Hall, Department of Linguistics and Prof. V.I. Subramoniam Memorial Conference Hall, CeLK, Department of Linguistics. Prof. K. Karunakaran chaired the first Technical session in the Smart Classroom. Five research papers were presented in the session. Prof. V. Deenathayali presented the paper on *Verse Rhythm-Style in Tolkapiyar's Poetics*. The paper discussed the Verse Rhythm-Style in Tolkaappiar's poetics and explained twenty verse rhythm-styles with examples. Prof. L. Ramamoorthy presented *Tolkapiyar's Conceptualization of Grammar*. He explained how fundamental concepts like time and space are used in the construction of grammar, how Tolkappiyar categorizes every aspect of the universe and how they are related to grammar. The roles of the eight cases in the conceptualization are studied to understand the conceptualization of grammar by Tolkappiyar. Dr. Niranjan Uppoor presented his paper on *Coordination in the South Asian Languages: Typology and Diachrony*. He discussed the typological features of South Asian languages – Dravidian, Indo-Iranian and Munda languages and explained the co-ordination strategy observed in the context of nominals and other word categories. Dr. P.N. Kamala presented a paper on *Nookku- A Rhetoric Element in Tolkappiyam*. Noman Tahir & Prof. M.J. Warsi presented a combined paper on *Long Distance Agreement with reference to conjunct verbs*. This paper was an analysis of the phenomenon of Long Distance Agreement between the infinitival object of a conjunct verb and a matrix verb in Hindi-Urdu.

TRAINING CUM WORKSHOP ON LINGUISTICS FOR MALAYSIAN TAMIL STUDENTS

REPORT

The Department of Linguistics, Bharathiar University, Coimbatore is conducting a Training cum Workshop on Linguistics for the Malaysian Tamil students at the university campus during 4-19, August-2023. It is an intensive programme in which the expert linguists of various fields deliver lectures through Tamil and English media. This programme aims to provide practical and theoretical training to the Malaysian Tamil students so as to enable them to take up Tamil linguistic researches at higher level. The current trends of General Linguistics and Applied Linguistics are to be presented in the lectures. Apart from classroom lectures the students will also explore historically and linguistically significant areas in and around Coimbatore. A two-day tribal field visit to the various areas of the Western Ghats is also a part of this programme.

The inaugural function was held at the Department of Linguistics, Bharathiar University on 04.08.2023.

In the Inaugural address Prof. Dr. Lovelina Little Flower, Vice-Chancellor's committee member, Bharathiar University welcomed the students and the faculty members of the University of Malaya who were present in the Bharathiar University campus and wished them a fruitful and comfortable stay. She appreciated the Department of Linguistics for organizing this international workshop.

Prof. Dr. K. Karunakaran, former Vice-Chancellor, Tamil University in his Key note address elaborated the role of linguistics in the overall development of human race. He recalled his long term association with the Department of Linguistics, University of Malaya. He advised the students who are from Malaysia to benefit out of the training which they are going to get from Bharathiar University.

PARAMĀRA DYNASTY AND PAṬANĀRĀYAṆA STONE INSCRIPTION

Between the 9th and 14th centuries, the Malwa and adjacent regions of west-central India were under the control of the Paramāra Dynasty. They belong to Paramāra clan of the Rajputs. They are also known by the name; Garoḍās, Luhāras, Kōḷīs etc. In the early years, having been hard pressed by the Rāṣṭrakūṭas, surrendered Malwa to their control, which was thereafter entrusted to the charge of Upendra, the founder of the Paramāra Dynasty. In the early part of the 10th century A.D., the Paramāras reconquered Malwa and established sovereignty over the greater portion of Northern India. The kingdom extended up to the foot of the Himalaya on the north, North Bengal on the east, the Narmada on the south, Saurāṣṭra, Sind, and the Punjab on the west. In the middle of the

10th century A.D., this vast empire collapsed, and was divided between a number of independent ruling dynasties. The regal insignia of Paramāra is the garuda in human form. This dynasty reached its pinnacle under the reign of Munja's nephew, Bhoja, whose realm extended from Vidisha in the east to Sabarmati in the west and from Chittor in the north to Konkan in the south. The oldest surviving Paramāra inscription, which was written by the 10th-century ruler Siyaka, has been found in Gujarat. Around 972 A.D., Siyaka conquered the Rāṣṭrakūṭa capital Manyaketa and established Paramāra as a sovereign state. The original inscription was found in the Paṭanārāyaṇa temple near Girvar located 4 miles west of Madgusudana in Sirohi State. The inscription consists of 39 lines covering a space of 2ft. 6 inches broad by 1 ft.11 inches high. The character depicted in the inscription are nāgari. The language is Sanskrit, lines 1-35 are written in verses (nos. 46). Lines from 35 to the end are in prose. The inscription is well maintained. The inscription is of great importance in connection with Paramāra history.
